

Sounding the alarm

At 11 am on 16 November, the bells of All Saints Northcote and St Mark's Fitzroy will ring 350 times. Ten years ago, church bells across Europe were rung 350 times, imploring governments and industry to act to reduce the level of carbon dioxide in the earth's atmosphere to 350 parts per million. Since then the level has steadily increased, reaching 415 this year. The bells will call attention to the seriousness of this situation. In a similar spirit, Rabbi Keren-Black will sound the traditional Shofar at the beginning of the forum itself.


